

Resolution on the 2024 Report on the Global Hunger Situation

CONSIDERING that the report published on May 16, 2025, by the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations and associated bodies reveals that more than 735 million people suffer from chronic hunger, and that this figure represents an alarming setback that reverses years of global progress;

RECOGNIZING the direct impact of the devastating consequences of the pandemic, compounded by the food crisis resulting from the Russian war against Ukraine, and clearly, the influence of climate change in countless affected areas, yet **NOTING** that, alongside these unfortunate circumstances, there is also a direct correlation with the sustained rise in hunger since 2019;

RECALLING that access to food is a basic human right, and that its denial or failure to ensure continuous access amounts to a modern form of violence and systematic exclusion;

In this context, IDC-CDI **DECLARES** that:

1. It **regrets** the widespread failure in the fight against hunger and calls for accountability from those who, by action or omission, have allowed the deterioration of global food security. Binding and verifiable measures must be promptly adopted by states and multilateral organizations to guarantee universal and dignified access to food, with priority given to the most vulnerable communities.
2. It **demand**s the mobilization of financial, technical, and political resources on a scale that matches the gravity of the problem, to implement emergency food plans in the most affected regions, without excuses, ideological conditions, or hidden interests.
3. It **warns** that the persistence of mass hunger constitutes a direct threat to peace, democracy, and human dignity. Therefore, it makes a strong call and urgent appeal to world leaders, especially those who have failed to make progress in the fight against hunger, reminding them that to govern is to protect lives, not statistics; and that hunger, in the 21st century, is a preventable shame that must be eradicated through political will and concrete action.
